The Incredible Story of our Resident: Kenneth 'Roy' Dodson

Kenneth 'Roy' Dodson was born in Hampstead, London, in February 1937 to Sybil and Ernest Dodson. As an only child, Roy's early years were shaped by the outbreak of the Second World War, during which he was evacuated three times. His first evacuation took him to Bromyard in Herefordshire with his Auntie Winner, followed by a move to Northampton, and finally to Wisbech in Cambridgeshire, where he first began school.

When the war ended, Roy returned to London and resumed his education at Gladstone Park School. At the age of 11, he won a place at Haberdashers' School, where he studied until 16. After finishing school, Roy joined his father working in the family's newsagents in Willesden, beginning his journey in the trade.

At 18, Roy completed his National Service in the Royal Air Force. He was stationed at Stenigot in Lincolnshire and later worked on radar systems near Dover. After two years of service, he returned to London to continue working alongside his father in the newsagents shop.

In 1965, on a train returning from a holiday in Newquay, Roy struck up a conversation with a fellow passenger named Joyce. She was on her way to Paddington for a new job. Six months later, Joyce got back in touch to say she had returned to London and asked if Roy would like to meet again. They did—and their story continued. The couple married on Easter Monday in 1969 in Willesden, celebrating with a reception at the local cricket club.

Following their marriage, Roy's parents retired, and the couple moved into the flat above the newsagents. Though they did not have children, Roy and Joyce shared many happy years working side by side in the shop. In 1997, they sold the business and moved to Edgware, where they continued to enjoy a quiet and content life together until Joyce's passing in 2012.

Roy has always had a passion for sport. He played cricket for South Hampstead, and while he admits he wasn't the strongest player on the field, he found his strength in administration, serving as the club's secretary. In his forties, Roy took up bowls—a sport in which he truly excelled. He played for Middlesex and was eventually honoured to become President of the county's bowls association. Sadly, due to a shoulder injury, he gave up playing in his seventies.

Now living with Parkinson's disease, Roy has made his home at Brampton Manor, where he has been for nearly four years. As one of the original six residents when the home first opened, he has seen it grow into a vibrant and full community. While he enjoys the entertainment on offer, his favourite pastime remains watching sport on Sky TV.





Valda's Recipe: (hocolate (hip) Muffins



30 - 40 mins

INGREDIENTS

- 300g self raising flour

- 80g caster sugar

METHOD

- 1. Preheat and prepare: Preheat the oven to 200°C and line a 12-hole muffin tray with paper cases.
- 2. Mix dry ingredients: In a large bowl, combine flour and baking powder. Rub in the butter until the mixture resembles breadcrumbs, then stir in the sugar and chocolate chips.
- 3. Combine wet ingredients: In a separate bowl, whisk together the eggs, milk, and vanilla extract. Pour into the dry ingredients and mix briefly until just combined.
- 4. Fill and bake: Spoon the batter into the muffin cases. Bake for 15–20 minutes, or until risen, golden, and firm to the touch.
- 5. Cool and serve: Allow to cool in the tin for 10 minutes, then transfer to a wire rack or serve warm.
